Forest Lake Demolition

It is always so hard to see a school demolished. This is a place where students learned and laughed and felt safe. It does become a little easier if we can offer a newer and more inviting space for learning though. Luckily, that is the case with the recent demolition of Forest Lake Elementary.

While it is hard to see this fixture of our district gone, the 70-year-old school has been empty this year as students spent their days in the new and renovated



elementaries. Forest Lake Elementary first opened its doors in 1951 and the school was no longer adequate for today's learning.

The land that Forest Lake sat on was exchanged with the City of Grand Rapids for the West Elementary site, minimizing the impact of the referendum on our taxpayers. Once demolition is completed, the city will begin construction of residential projects.

GRHS Interact Club and IB Students Recognized

Earlier this spring, Itasca County Public acknowledged the Grand Rapids Senior High School Interact Club and International Baccalaureate (IB) students, under the leadership of GRHS Social Studies teacher Brielle Carlson, for their efforts to support our local COVID-19 vaccination efforts.

At the onset of our vaccine rollout, it became evident there were barriers making it difficult for some in our community to schedule vaccine appointments on their own. This was especially true for those who did not have access to technology. In February, Public Health staff approached Mrs. Carlson with the idea of forming a collaboration between students, Itasca County Public Health, and Eldercircle, to assist those who were seeking help. Mrs. Carlson and four IB students



organized a plan and worked after school contacting individuals and helping them register for vaccine appointments.

In addition, students provided outreach calls to area employers to notify them of vaccine eligibility.



The Interact Club students joined the IB group and participated by volunteering their time at COVID vaccine clinics each week. They assisted with appointment registration and directed patients through the clinic.

Public Health and our local community benefitted from the assistance of these professional and capable high school students. We are grateful to them and Brielle Carlson, who, when asked, pitched in to help in the effort to end this pandemic. Thank you for collaborating with our community partners! GRHS Receives Award for Closing Learning Gaps

After enduring five different learning model transitions, principals and teachers at Grand Rapids High School (GRHS) recognized the need to address growing learning gaps in their students' high school experience. Like many schools across the state, the struggles for students and staff during last year's distance learning during lockdown were compounded by the need to change from in-person learning, to hybrid, to full-distance and back again.

"Each learning model presented new challenges, while at the same time amplifying existing struggles for students," said GRHS Principal Matt Dass. "We recognized the need to respond accordingly for the benefit of our students and to preserve on-time graduations."

Early in the school year, GRHS staff and administration recognized that students would need additional supports to find success and close learning gaps. Teachers and administrators worked hard to identify students who were in danger of failing and created opportunities for students to recover semester credits in their classes. Significant gains were made in English and Math as well as core content and elective classes.

"I am so proud of the implementation of evidence-based practices by our high school teachers and principals," said Sue Akre, Director of Teaching and Learning. "They have tried to minimize the impact of the pandemic on our students and have also created a model that can be replicated in the future to help all students achieve our state's rigorous standards."

The hard work by both students and staff has paid off. In addition to minimizing failed coursework by over 66%, the school has been recognized by the Minnesota Association of Secondary School Principals (MASSP). MASSP has presented GRHS with a Gold Star of Innovation Award. The Star of Innovation Award is designed to recognize MASSP member schools statewide for the development and support of an exemplary and innovative education program in their school. Awards are given at gold, silver, and bronze levels.

"Our staff and administration can proudly look our community members in the eye and confidently state, in the middle of a global pandemic, that every student is being served to the best of our ability," said Dass.

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Budget Challenges

Like many schools across the nation, ISD 318 has been facing budget challenges. In our case, the challenges have come from a reduction in compensatory funds and a drop in enrollment due to the pandemic. Compensatory aid comes from families who complete an Educational Benefit form, also known as a Free and Reduced Meal form. With free meals provided by the federal government to help all families during the pandemic, the district saw a significant drop in benefit form submissions, which will result in lower aid from state government sources for the coming year.

At the March 22nd Board Meeting, a budget reduction plan was presented to the board that contains nearly \$2 million in budget reductions. Every effort was made to create reductions that had the least impact to our students. The district has been striving to reduce ongoing expenditures since the beginning of the 2019-2020 school year and increased reductions became necessary as a result of the pandemic.

While our current enrollment loss due to the pandemic is a contributing factor to budget challenges, our renovated and newly constructed elementary buildings were done just in time because our long-term enrollment projections look strong and the construction costs were funded completely by the voter-approved referendum. In fact, having new elementaries with adequate space for our students and improved ventilation allowed us to keep students in person for longer during the pandemic. And, while enrollment has been down as parents choose to homeschool or enroll their students in online virtual academies, we are confident that enrollment levels will return to pre-pandemic levels next year. Next year's Kindergarten enrollment is consistent with predictions made at the start of the referendum process.

This is all a process that will create a healthy budget that can sustain our students and staff long-term regardless of economic upheaval. If you have questions, please contact the Superintendent's Office at 218-327-5704. And, be sure to fill our your Educational Benefit forms this fall!

Cares Act and ESSER Spending

In response to the pandemic, the federal government has supported schools with additional funding. Three rounds of funding are available for schools. Last summer, schools were provided with funding as a result of the Cares Act. This was emergency funding that schools could use to support students in learning for the 2020-2021 school year. At ISD 318, that money was used for technology to support distance learning, such as hot spots and iPads for students; cleaning supplies and enhanced cleaning techniques; items that supported social distancing, such as purchasing desks to replace learning tables where students were crowded together; and other pandemic mitigation strategies, such as infrared thermometers and face-coverings for students.

At the beginning of January, an additional \$54.3 billion was approved for schools across the nation through the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund (ESSER II Fund). ISD 318 received \$2.6 million. In planning for use of these funds, the district identified four priorities. Funds are being used to provide academic interventions and student support to help students with learning gaps; to create and expand systems to detect and respond to increased mental health and behavioral needs; to ensure adequate staffing for effective and safe instruction; and to invest in physical learning environments to improve teaching and learning conditions, health and safety, and operational efficiency.

The district will receive a third allocation of funds known as the ESSER III fund. These funds will be distributed using the same priorities identified above.
